A Message From President Fred Zuckerman

In the past few months there has been much chaos and confusion at the International over upcoming negotiations with UPS.

For those who are not up to speed, Sean O'Brien (President of Local 25 and Eastern Region Vice President) was appointed as IBT Package Division Director and was set to lead national negotiations with UPS. Despite any previous disagreements we may have had with Brother O'Brien, the work he was doing since being appointed to lead the Package Division was a welcome change in direction. O'Brien was working hard to build trust and unity among the Local Unions that represent UPS members, something the International has been publically calling for (see the word UNITY on the front of the most recent Teamsters magazine). He was reaching out to Local Unions that the previous Director, General Secretary-Treasurer Ken Hall, had ignored. He was rebuilding trust amongst UPS members, and standing up to the corporate giant that is UPS. He was showing a willingness to stand up and fight UPS on behalf our members that the International has long lacked.

General President Hoffa's decision to remove O'Brien is offensive and smacks of self-interest and poor leadership. To jeopardize negotiations with our Union's largest employer in this manner is an insult to our members and a knife in the back to the very ideals our Union stands for.

Rest assured, Teamsters Local 89 will not sit idly by while chaos consumes UPS negotiations. We will continue to fight, and fight hard, as we have always done. Our members deserve better than this, and regardless of the absurd games being played with the Package Division, we will never stop fighting. We will never surrender. We will stand up to UPS in these upcoming negotiations, unflinching, unwavering, and resolved to win the contract our members deserve.

And, despite this clear attempt to fracture the Unity and Trust that O'Brien was attempting to build, we will not be standing alone. The membership of the International Brotherhood of Teamsters is awoken, energized, and ready to fight for what they deserve. This cowardly act will not silence us. It will only make us stand taller.

In fact, Local 89 Secretary-Treasurer John Bolton and Vice President and Central Region Vice President Avral Thompson were recently placed on the UPS National Negotiating Committee. The presence of two seasoned Local 89 leaders gives our members two powerful voices that will not be silenced. Furthermore, due to their positions John and Avral will be able to provide us with a wealth of knowledge and insights that will only strengthen us in our Local negotiations at the UPS Air District.

Organizing Victory at IMI Oldham Co.

Workers at a newly built IMI facility in Oldham County, Kentucky achieved a great victory today when they voted in favor of joining Teamsters Local 89.

Recording Secretary and Business Agent Jeff Cooper was approached by these drivers approximately 20 days ago about becoming members of Teamsters Local 89. The drivers were being trained in a unionized IMI plant in Louisville while their facility was under construction, and frequently spoke to Teamster members there about the benefits of being in our great union.

After a majority of cards were signed, Organizer and Business Agent Jay Dennis assisted in filing the paperwork to call for an election approximately two weeks ago, while Cooper continued to speak directly to the Oldham County drivers as often as possible.

We would like to thank our existing IMI members in Louisville, Selinda, Middletown, and Shepherdsville, for speaking to these new brothers about the benefits of being a part of Teamsters Local 89. We would also like to thank Kyle Higdon, one of our new brothers, for being the observer for the Teamsters at the vote count this morning.

On behalf of President Fred Zuckerman and the Officers, Agents, and Staff of Teamsters Local 89, congratulations and welcome to our new IMI Oldham County members!

Hurricane Relief Efforts

On Friday, September 2nd, members from Teamsters Local 89 assisted UAW 862 OnLine, Greater Louisville Central Labor Council, GL-CLC, and dozens of other area labor unions in sending supplies to hurricane Harvey victims in Texas.



The operation, which came together in a matter of days, was started by a rank-and-file UAW member named Frank Rouse who reached out to his local leadership for help gathering supplies, who in turn reached out to Teamsters 89 to help with transportation.



"It is the duty of organized labor to assist those in need," said President Fred Zuckerman. "Whether by negotiating strong contracts, or sending much needed supplies to victims of natural disasters, helping people is what unions do."

Business Agent Jay Dennis ran point for Teamsters Local 89, working with President Zuckerman to secure the Teamsters Joint Council 94 semi-truck to transport supplies to Louisiana where relief efforts were being coordinated. Retired Local 89 member Herman Veltman volunteered to drive the semi, which left Friday afternoon with its 48-foot trailer filled with supplies loaded by union volunteers, including Local 89 Business Agent James DeWeese.

Thanks to the generosity of Louisville area union members, the Teamsters JC94 trailer simply wasn't enough. After the semi left for Louisiana, supplies continued to pour in, and a rental truck and personal truck trailer were brought in to finish loading up. This second operation took place at the UAW 862 union hall, where volunteers worked in the rain that had once been part of hurricane Harvey, to get the last of the relief supplies loaded.

"It's incredible, but it's not something surprising to me either," said Teamsters Local 89 Communications Director Stephen Piercey. "Unions come together very well for our community; we always have."

Since these supplies were sent to Texas to aid the victims of Hurricane Harvey, our Teamsters brothers and sisters in Florida and Puerto Rico have also been devastated by Hurricanes Irma and Maria. They too need our help to rebuild.

2017 Kentucky Labor-Management Conference

On Wednesday night, September 13th, Teamsters Local 89 President Fred Zuckerman was the guest of honor at Kentucky's 40th Labor-Management Conference and was given the 2017 Kentucky Labor Award.

Todd Dunn, Labor Chair of the Conference and President of UAW Local 862, presented the award. Other speakers included State Representative Will Coursey, and Kentucky Attorney General Andy Beshear attended as the keynote speaker for the night.

President Zuckerman was given this prestigious award for his years of dedicated service to the Kentucky Labor Movement, which has improved the lives of thousands of hard-working men and women in the Teamsters and beyond.

The room was packed with labor union officials from all across the state, including IBT Central Region Vice

President Avral Thompson, President John Stovall of Teamsters Local Union 783, and President Patty Grimm of Teamsters Local 236.

During his acceptance speech, President Zuckerman spoke about the need to reach out to young workers and bring them into the Labor Movement to make it thrive again, and thanked everyone in the room for their dedication to the Movement.

"You guys are my heroes. You guys get up every morning, you hit the streets, you do the education," said President Zuckerman. "We go out and organize, we get the job done. And I appreciate everything you guys do."

TEAMSTERS TONIS BACCIS

LOCAL 89

After a seven-month battle with his empl termination, Chief-Steward Tom Corbett triu

Tom had worked for International Paper (IP) for thirteen years and had been Chief-Steward for seven when management decided to make an example out of him. IP, which makes corrugated boxes for many major companies, had a strict "lock-out, tag-out" procedure. In essence, any piece of equipment that needed to be adjusted had to be shut off completely, locked out so it couldn't be restarted, and tagged by the person who did so before it could be modified in any way.

There was, however, one particular adjustment on one particular machine IP that management knowingly did not enforce the ir "lock-out, tag-out" rule on. This was because the adjustment needed was merely moving the glue gun slightly, a task that had to be done dozens of times per shift, and doing so did not put the operator in harm's way as most mechanical adjustments would. They even removed a safety guard from this particular machine to make it easier for the operator to reach the glue gun in question!

This particular machine also happened to be operated by a particular worker; Chief-Steward Tom Corbett.

In November of 2016, a manager was walking past Tom's machine and saw him adjust the glue gun as he had always done. The manager told Tom that he shouldn't be doing this with the machine running. This surprised Tom, as the practice had never been used for adjusting the glue gun before, but he stopped what he was doing and complied with the manager's instructions. Later that day, he was called into the office by the same manager and suspended pending investigation. After a six-day investigation, IP terminated Tom for failing to follow "lock-out, tagout" procedures.

This termination ultimately led to a mediation, which took place in January of 2017. Business Agent Jay Dennis put on a very thorough case built by hard evidence. Nineteen images, nine statements from Tom's co-workers, and testimony from acting Chief-Steward Floyd Glass and Stewards Richard "Snoop" Conn and Cody Rigdon, were all presented by Teamsters Local 89. The evidence proved rather conclusively that that "lock-out, tag-out" had never been previously applied to this procedure, and that in adjusting the glue gun on this specific machine, Tom Corbett was following an established practice that had been used by union members, outside vendors, and even management themselves for years.

Despite the clear evidence, and despite the mediator attempting to make management see reason, the

yer, International Paper, over a wrongful mphantly returned to work in June.

Company continued to refuse to budge, insisting that Tom should remain terminated, and so the argument moved into arbitration.

Arbitration took place in late March, but not for the termination. IP had terminated Tom via progressive discipline as he had already had a previous suspension under almost identical circumstances. This suspension, which Local 89 also fully believed to be unjust, had been moving along the disciplinary process parallel to the termination. It was this suspension that would ultimately prove to be the key to the entire case.

At the suspension arbitration, which took place in late March, Business Agent Jay Dennis again presented a strong case which was built with the help of IP stewards. Once again it was filled with evidence proving Tom's innocence, including testimonies from a number of his fellow Teamsters. Just like before, IP dug their heels in and refused to admit that they were wrong, and so it was up to the arbitrator to make the final call.

The arbitrator's decision was not rendered until mid-June, but it was worth the wait. He ruled completely in favor of Teamsters Local 89 and Tom, and ordered he be made whole for all losses he had taken. As a result of this suspension being overturned, which made the company's argument of progressive discipline null and void, all other matters were swiftly resolved to Tom's satisfaction and he soon returned to work.

This case was a classic example of Teamster power. Members at International Paper rallied around their Chief-Steward when he was wrongly terminated. They wrote statements and testified, they wore buttons supplied by Teamsters Local 89 that said, "Stand With Tom". Tom's Business Agent and fellow Stewards investigated and built a solid case on a foundation of facts and evidence. The strongest in all of this, though, was Tom himself. Not once did he waver. Not once did he give up the fight. Despite the length of time it took to go from grievance, to mediator, to arbitration, to final decision, Tom never stopped believing that we would win the battle.

We would like to thank everyone at IP who came together and stood up for Tom via statements, testimonies, wearing buttons, and every other action that was taken. Business Agent Jay Dennis would also like to thank Floyd Glass for filling in as Chief-Steward, and Stewards Richard "Snoop" Conn and Cody Rigdon for stepping up when they were needed most.

Thanks to all this and his own resilience, Tom's back, he's Chief-Steward again, and he remains a proud member of Teamsters Local 89.



59 YEARS OF HISTORY


59 years ago Teamsters Local 89 built a new union hall, the amazing building which we still operate out of today.

NOTICE OF 2017 NOMINATIONS AND ELECTION OF LOCAL UNION OFFICERS

Nominations for the offices of President, Vice-President, Secretary-Treasurer, Recording Secretary and three (3) Trustees will take place at a meeting to be held on **Wednesday, November 8, 2017 at 7:00 P.M. at Local 89's Meeting Hall (3813 Taylor Blvd., Louisville, KY 40215).** The terms of office will commence on **January 1, 2018**, and will run until **December 31, 2021**.

To be eligible to run for office in the Local Union, a member must be in compliance with Article II, Section 4(a)(1) of the International Constitution. A member must be in continuous good standing and actively employed at the craft within the jurisdiction of the Local Union for a period of twenty-four (24) consecutive months prior to the month of nomination for said office and must be eligible to hold the office if elected. "Continuous good standing" means compliance with the provisions of Article X, Section 5 of the International Constitution concerning the payment of dues for a period of twenty-four (24) consecutive months together with no interruptions in active membership in the Local Union for which office is sought because of suspensions, expulsions, withdrawals, transfers or failure to pay fines or assessments. Periods of unemployment during the twenty-four (24) month period preceding the nomination shall not be considered a break in active employment at the craft within the jurisdiction of the Local Union if the nominee was actively seeking and available for employment in the craft and not working outside the craft during such periods of unemployment. The 50% meeting attendance requirement shall not be enforced as a condition of eligibility to run for office in this election.

Nominations and seconds can be made from the floor at the **November 8th** meeting or in writing. All written nominations or seconds must be received by the Independent Election Supervisor no later than **7:00PM on Wednesday, November 8, 2017**. Nominations must be made by a member in good standing other than the nominee, and seconded by a member in good standing other than the nominee, and seconded by a member or ally or in writing. Written nominations, seconds, or acceptances should be sealed, addressed, and sent by certified mail to: Independent Election Supervisor c/o Local 89 Secretary-Treasurer, 3813 Taylor Blvd., Louisville, KY 40215. Candidates may accept nomination for only one (1) office and members may nominate one (1) candidate, but only one (1), for each office open. For members to be eligible to nominate or second a nomination, a member must have his or her dues paid through the month of **October 2017**. Prospective nominators and seconders. Copies of the Articles of the International Constitution and the Local 89 Bylaws, which include the rules governing the conduct of this election, are available upon request to Local 89's office.

The ballots will be counted at the Local 89 Union Hall, 3813 Taylor Boulevard, Louisville, Kentucky on December 16, 2017, after the polls have closed.

Absentee ballots will automatically be mailed on or about **November 13, 2017**, to members in good standing who are employed outside of a twenty (20) mile radius of the city of Louisville, Kentucky. Ballots will be mailed to the most current address contained in the Local Union records. It is each member's responsibility to ensure that the Local Union has his or her correct address. If an active member has moved recently or has not received Local Union correspondence, the 89 Teamster magazine, the International Union magazine, or this Notice, the member should notify the Local Union of his or her correct address immediately. Any qualifying member in good standing who does not automatically receive his or her absentee ballot within a reasonable period of time from the **November 13, 2017**, mailing date must request a duplicate absentee ballot by **4:00PM on November 30, 2017**. Duplicate absentee ballots will be mailed on **December 1, 2017**.

Absentee ballots may also be obtained by mail from the Local Union's headquarters in Louisville upon written request. The written request for an absentee ballot must be addressed to the Election Supervisor and received **before 4:00PM on November 30, 2017**. Only a member in good standing who will be unable to vote at the polls because he or she is ill or disabled; will be away from home on vacation; on work assignment outside of a twenty (20) mile radius of the city of Louisville, Kentucky; or his/her work or personal schedule will interfere with his/her ability to vote is entitled to request an absentee ballot. Absentee ballots requested for the aforementioned reasons will be mailed **on December 1, 2017**.

All absentee ballots must be received at the designated Post Office Box by 12:00 P.M. (Noon), Saturday, December 16, 2017, in order to be counted. The ballots will be picked up at the Post Office on Saturday, December 16, 2017, at or around 12:30 P.M. and counted at the conclusion of the Election on Saturday, December 16, 2017.

Instructions for completing the absentee ballot will be enclosed in the ballot package. This is a secret ballot vote. Do not give your ballot to anyone. You should mark your absentee ballot in private and mail your absentee ballot, sealed in the secret ballot envelope, to the designated Post Office Box in the postage paid business reply envelope provided. Member identification information to be entered on the outer envelope will be used only to determine voter eligibility and will not affect the secrecy of the ballot.

To be eligible to vote, a member must be in good standing and have his or her full initiation fee and dues paid through November 2017. Members will have until 4:30 P.M. on December 14, 2017 to pay their fees and dues at the Local Union's office in order to have their ballots counted. A member on dues check-off shall not lose good standing as a result of failure by the employer to make a proper deduction for any month in which the member had earnings from work performed during the month from which the dues could have been deducted or has earnings from which the employer normally makes a dues deduction pursuant to the contract or established practice.

Any pre-election protest must be filed with Local 89's Secretary-Treasurer in accordance with the provisions of Article XXII, Section 5(a) of the International Constitution. Any post-election protest must be filed with the Secretary-Treasurer of Joint Council No. 94 in accordance with Article XXII, Section 5(b) of the International Constitution.


